This brochure is designed to provide the public with information and a summary of regulations pertaining to hunting and other recreational use on the Citrus Wildlife Management Area. **Regulations that are new or differ substantially from last year are shown in bold print.** Area users should familiarize themselves with all regulations. For exact wording of the wildlife laws and regulations, see the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's wildlife code, on file with the Secretary of State and state libraries. This brochure, the Florida Hunting Regulations handbook, and quota permit worksheets should provide the information necessary for you to plan your hunting activities. These publications are available from any Commission office, county tax collector and at MyFWC.com.

Persons using wildlife management areas are required to have appropriate licenses, permits and stamps. The following persons are exempt from all license and permit requirements (except for quota permits when listed as "no exemptions", recreational use permits, antlerless deer permits and the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp [federal duck stamp]): Florida residents who are 65 years of age or older; residents who possess a Florida Resident Disabled Person Hunting and Fishing Certificate; residents in the U.S. Armed Forces, not stationed in Florida, while home on leave for 30 days or less, upon submission of orders; and children under 16 years of age. Children under 16 years of age are exempt from the federal duck stamp. Anyone born on or after June 1, 1975 and 16 years of age or older must have passed a Commission-approved hunter-safety course prior to being issued a hunting license, except the Hunter Safety Mentoring exemption allows anyone to purchase a hunting license and hunt under the supervision of a licensed hunter, 21 years of age or older, for one year.

Licenses and permits may be purchased from county tax collectors, license agents, at MyFWC.com/license or by telephone at 1-888-486-8356. A nocost Migratory Bird Permit is available when purchasing a hunting license. Any waterfowl hunter 16 years of age or older must possess a federal duck stamp; available where hunting licenses are sold, at most post offices or at duckstamp.com.

QUOTA PERMIT INFORMATION:

Archery (first 4 days) - 1,000, no-cost, quota permits.

Muzzleloading Gun - 850, no-cost, quota permits for each of 2 hunts.

General Gun - 850, no-cost, quota permits for each of 2 hunts.

Youth Turkey - 25, no-cost, quota permits (no exemptions).

 $\underline{\text{Spring Turkey}}$ - 25, no-cost, quota permits (no exemptions) for each of 3 hunts.

Permit applications: Hunters must submit electronic applications for quota and special-opportunity permits through the Commission's Total Licensing System (TLS). Worksheets listing hunts, application periods, deadlines and instructions are available at county tax collector's offices, FWC offices or

<u>MyFWC.com</u>. Quota application periods occur throughout the year beginning April 1; please refer to the hunting handbook or <u>MyFWC.com</u> for specific dates. Worksheets will be available about 2 weeks prior to each application period.

Guest hunters: For each non-transferable archery, muzzleloading gun, general gun, wild hog, spring turkey and mobility-impaired quota permit issued through the Commission's TLS, only one guest permit may be obtained. Guest permits are not issued for youth turkey quota permits. The following persons may be a guest hunter, but are not required to obtain a guest permit: a youth under 16 years of age, a youth supervisor, a mentor license holder or a mentor license supervisor. A quota permit holder (host) may only bring 1 guest hunter at a time. The following persons are not considered to be guest hunters: other quota permit holders, non-hunters and exempt hunters (on areas and during seasons that allow exemptions). The host must share the bag limit with the guest and the host is responsible for violations that exceed the bag limit. The guest and host must enter and exit the area together and must share a street-legal vehicle while hunting on the area. The guest may only hunt while the host is on the area. A person is only eligible for one guest permit per hunt. Guest permits may only be obtained from license agents or county tax collector's offices. Guest permits may be obtained up to and during the last day of the hunt. Refer to the quota hunt worksheets for additional information.

Youth and mentor license holders: A youth hunter (less than 16 years of age) must be supervised by a person at least 18 years of age. A mentor license holder must be supervised by a licensed hunter at least 21 years of age. Unless exempt, only those supervisors with proper licenses and permits may hunt. If the supervisor is hunting during any hunt (not including special-opportunity) for which quota permits are issued, at least one person in the party must be in possession of a quota permit. During a hunt that allows exemptions, a non-exempt supervisor of a youth must have a quota permit to hunt. A non-hunting supervisor is allowed to accompany a youth or mentor license holder during any hunt (including special-opportunity).

Transfer of permits: Quota and guest permits are not transferable. Except for youth under 16 years of age, a positive form of identification is required when using a non-transferable permit. The sale or purchase of any quota permit or guest permit is prohibited.

GENERAL AREA REGULATIONS:

All general laws and regulations relating to wildlife and fish shall apply unless specifically exempted for this area. Hunting or the taking of wildlife or fish on this area shall be allowed only during the open seasons and in accordance with the following regulations:

 Any person hunting deer or accompanying another person hunting deer shall wear at least 500 square inches of daylight fluorescent-orange

- material as an outer garment, above the waistline. These provisions are not required when hunting with a bow and arrow during archery season.
- Taking of spotted fawn, swimming deer or roosted turkey is prohibited. Species legal to hunt are listed under each season.
- 3. It is illegal to hunt over bait or place any bait or other food for wildlife on this area.
- Driving a metal object into any tree, or hunting from a tree into which a metal object has been driven, is prohibited.
- No person shall cut, damage or remove any natural, man-made or cultural resource without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
- 6. Taking or attempting to take any game with the aid of live decoys, recorded game calls or sounds, set guns, artificial light, net, trap, snare, drug or poison is prohibited. Recorded calls and sounds can be used to hunt furbearers, wild hog and crows.
- 7. The wanton and willful waste of wildlife is prohibited.
- 8. Hunting, fishing or trapping is prohibited on any portion of the area posted as closed to those activities.
- People, dogs, vehicles and other recreational equipment are prohibited in areas posted as "Closed to Public Access" by FWC administrative action.
- Taking or herding wildlife from any motorized vehicle, aircraft or boat which is under power is prohibited, until power and movement from that power, has ceased.
- 11. Most game may be hunted from ½ hour before sunrise until ½ hour after sunset (see exceptions for each season).
- 12. The release of any animal is prohibited, without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
- The head and evidence of sex may not be removed from the carcass of any deer or turkey on the area.
- 14. The planting or introduction of any non-native plant is prohibited, without written authorization of the landowner or primary land manager.
- 15. Wild hog may not be transported alive.
- 16. Littering is prohibited.
- 17. It is unlawful to set fire to any forest, grass or woodlands.
- 18. A Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Law Enforcement Officer may search any camp, vehicle or boat, in accordance with law.
- 19. Falconers may hunt during the statewide falconry season anytime a management area is open for public access. Falconers are not exempt from quota permits during hunts requiring them.

PUBLIC ACCESS AND VEHICLES:

- 1. Open to public access year round.
- 2. Persons operating vehicles shall enter and exit only at a designated entrance.
- 3. Vehicles may be operated only on named or numbered roads.
- 4. Parked vehicles may not obstruct a road, gate or firelane.
- No motor vehicle shall be operated on any part of any wildlife management area that has been designated as closed to vehicular traffic.
- 6. The use of all-terrain vehicles is prohibited.
- Horses may be ridden only on named or numbered roads, or designated horse trails.
- 8. A marked footpath called the Florida Trail traverses the area. This trail is open to hikers throughout the year.

HUNTERS AND CHECK STATIONS:

- 1. Hunting equipment and dogs may be taken onto the WMA after 8 a.m. the day before the opening of a season and shall be removed by 6 p.m. one day after the end of the season.
- No deer or turkey shall be dismembered or removed from the area until checked at the check station.
- Quail hunting is prohibited east of County Road 491 between Forest Road 16 and County Road 480.
- 4. The use of horses for hunting is prohibited, except during the small game season.

GUNS:

- All firearms shall be securely encased and in a vehicle, vessel, camper or tent, during periods when they are not a legal method of take. Persons in possession of a valid Concealed Weapon or Firearm License may carry concealed handguns.
- 2. Target practice is prohibited.
- Hunting or the display or use of a gun in a manner capable of taking wildlife on or from rights-of-way of all paved roads is prohibited.

- 4. Hunting with a gun and light is prohibited.
- Muzzleloading guns used for taking deer must be .40 caliber or larger, if firing a single bullet, or be 20 gauge or larger if firing two or more balls.
- 6. Children under the age of 16 may not be in possession of a firearm unless in the presence of a supervising adult.
- No person shall have a gun under control while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- 8. For hunting non-migratory game, only shotguns, rifles, pistols, bows, crossbows or falconry may be used. Hunting during the spring turkey season with firearms other than shotguns or using a shot size larger than #2 is prohibited.
- 9. For hunting migratory game, only shotguns, bows, crossbows or falconry may be used. Shotguns shall not be larger than 10 gauge and shall be incapable of holding more than three shells in the magazine and chamber combined.
- Firearms using rimfire or non-expanding, full metal jacket (military ball) ammunition are prohibited for taking deer.
- 11. Fully automatic or silencer-equipped firearms, centerfire semi-automatic rifles having a magazine capable of holding more than five rounds, explosive or drug-injecting devices and set guns are prohibited.

DOGS:

- 1. Hunting deer with dogs is prohibited.
- Hunting with dogs is prohibited, except bird dogs are allowed during the small game season and field trial events. Field trial events are authorized only in the area east of County Road 491 between Forest Road 16 and County Road 480.
- 3. Bird dogs may be trained from ½ hour before sunrise until ½ hour after sunset, October 1-31, in the area east of County Road 491 between Forest Road 16 and 20.
- 4. No person shall allow any dog to pursue or molest any wildlife during any period in which the taking of wildlife by the use of dogs is prohibited.
- 5. Dogs on leashes may be used for trailing wounded game.
- For purposes other than hunting, dogs are allowed, but must be kept under physical restraint at all times.

CAMPING:

- The Division of Forestry regulates camping and a fee is required. Hunt camps also require a permit for reserved camping. For more information and dates hunt camps are open to the public, call the Withlacoochee State Forest Recreation Visitors Center at 352-754-6896. Sale of available reserved hunt camp sites begins the first Thursday after Labor Day.
- 2. When camping is allowed, only designated campsites may be used.
- Only tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping.
- 4. During the small game season, dogs under restraint are allowed in the overflow area of the Holder Mine campsite.
- 5. Firewood may only be gathered to be burned in a designated area in a Division of Forestry campground with a valid camping permit.

BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS: During quota hunts, host hunters and guests must share all bag and possession limits.

- 1. Deer Daily limit 2, possession limit 4.
- 2. Wild hog No size or bag limit.
- 3. Turkey One per quota permit, season limit 2.
- 4. Gray squirrel, quail and rabbit Daily limit 12, possession limit 24 for each
- Raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk and nutria No bag limits.
- Bobcat and otter Possession limit 1 unless in possession of a Trapping License.
- 7. Migratory birds See Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet.

ARCHERY SEASON:

November 5-27.

<u>Permit, Stamp and License Requirements</u> - Quota permit (if hunting during first 4 days), hunting license, management area permit, archery permit, deer permit (if hunting deer), migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

<u>Legal to Hunt</u> - Deer with at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria and migratory birds in season.

Regulations Unique to Archery Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply. Hunting with firearms or crossbows (except by disabled crossbow permit) is prohibited, except that centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting migratory birds when one or more species are legal to hunt (see Migratory Bird section and the current Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet).

MUZZLELOADING GUN SEASON:

December 3-4 and 17-18.

<u>Permit, Stamp and License Requirements</u> - Quota permit, hunting license, management area permit, muzzleloading gun permit, deer permit (if hunting deer), migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

<u>Legal to Hunt</u> - Deer with at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria, bobcat, otter and migratory birds in season.

Regulations Unique to Muzzleloading Gun Season - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply. Hunting with archery equipment or firearms, other than muzzleloading guns, is prohibited, except that centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting migratory birds when one or more species are legal to hunt (see Migratory Bird section and the current Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet).

GENERAL GUN SEASON:

December 10-11 and December 31 through January 1.

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Quota permit, hunting license, management area permit, deer permit (if hunting deer), migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

<u>Legal to Hunt</u> - Deer with at least one antler 5 inches or more in length, wild hog, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria, bobcat and otter and migratory birds in season.

<u>Regulations Unique to General Gun Season</u> - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

SMALL GAME SEASON:

January 2 through February 26.

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Hunting license, management area permit, migratory bird permit (if hunting migratory birds), and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

<u>Legal to Hunt</u> - Wild hog, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, raccoon, opossum, armadillo, beaver, coyote, skunk, nutria, bobcat, otter and migratory birds in season.

<u>Regulations Unique to Small Game Season</u> - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

- 1. Hunting with bird dogs is allowed.
- Hunting from horses is allowed and horses may be ridden only on named or numbered roads, or designated horse trails.
- 3. Hunting with centerfire rifles is prohibited.

TRAPPING: Prohibited.

SPRING TURKEY SEASON:

Youth Turkey: March 10-11.

Spring Turkey: March 20-22, April 3-5 and 17-19.

Permit, Stamp and License Requirements - Quota permit, hunting license, management area permit and wild turkey permit.

<u>Legal to Hunt</u> - Bearded turkey or gobbler.

<u>Regulations Unique to Spring Turkey Season</u> - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations shall apply.

- 1. Legal shooting hours are ½ hour before sunrise until 1 p.m.
- 2. Hunting other animals is prohibited.
- 3. Hunting with firearms other than shotguns or using a shot size larger than #2 is prohibited.
- 4. During the youth turkey hunt, only youth under 16 years of age may hunt and must be under the supervision and in the presence of an adult not younger than 18 years of age. Adults with required licenses and permits for taking wild turkeys may participate when in the presence of a youth, but may not harvest a wild turkey.

MIGRATORY BIRD SEASONS:

Rails, common moorhen, mourning dove, white-winged dove, snipe, duck, geese, coot, woodcock and crows may be hunted during seasons established by the Commission for these species that coincide with the archery, muzzleloading gun, general gun or small game seasons.

<u>Permit, Stamp and License Requirements</u> - Quota permit (if hunting during any quota period), hunting license, management area permit, migratory bird permit, and state waterfowl permit and federal duck stamp (if hunting waterfowl).

Legal to Hunt - See Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations pamphlet.

<u>Regulations Unique to Migratory Bird Seasons</u> - In addition to these regulations, all General Area Regulations and Migratory Bird Regulations shall apply.

- 1. Hunting duck, geese and coot with lead shot is prohibited.
- 2. Centerfire shotguns are allowed for hunting during established area seasons when one or more migratory birds are legal to hunt.

FISHING AND FROGGING:

Allowed year round.

<u>Permit, Stamp and License Requirements</u> - Fishing license (not required when frogging).

Legal to Take - See Florida Freshwater Fishing Regulations Summary.

Regulations Unique to Fishing and Frogging - All General Area Regulations and General Freshwater Fishing Regulations shall apply. Shooting frogs is allowed only during the listed open hunting seasons and only with the legal methods of take during each particular season.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

- 1. Water in wells is not certified for human consumption.
- Information for persons with disabilities can be found at MyFWC.com/ADA.

DIVISION OF FORESTRY RULES AND INFORMATION:

- The maximum speed limit on all forest roads is 30 MPH unless otherwise posted.
- Construction of permanent or semi-permanent structures on State Forests is prohibited.
- 3. A valid firewood permit is required from the Division of Forestry before firewood may be removed from the State Forest.
- Unless posted as closed, horse, hiking and bicycle trails are open. For information call the Division of Forestry, Withlacoochee Forestry Center, 352-754-6896.
- 5. Dogs are prohibited in areas posted as "Closed to Pets."
- Division of Forestry management plans include prescribed burning most months of the year. For personal safety reasons, area users should contact the Division of Forestry for information and location of burn areas at 352-754-6896.
- 7. No pet is allowed on managed lands unless the pet is confined or restrained on a leash no more than ten feet in length unless otherwise noted in the DOGS section of this brochure. NOTE: Certain portions of managed lands may be posted prohibiting pets.

COOPERATION REQUESTED:
